

THREE COMPONENTS OF AN INTRODUCTION

FIRST SENTENCE

Introduces topic in an interesting way

INFORMATIVE SENTENCES

Explains the first sentence and builds to thesis

THESIS STATEMENT

Makes a claim or states a view that you will support

INTRODUCTIONS SHOULD...

1. State the **broad topic.**



2. Make a **focused statement** about your broad topic.

3. Tell readers why your topic is **important** or **relevant** and give **background**


information.

EFFECTIVE INTRODUCTION STRATEGIES

1. Consider the **question** you are answering. Your thesis is the answer to the question.

2. **Start broad**, then focus on the details.

3. **Re-write** your introduction after the paper is finished.
